Dual Eligible Special Needs Plans (D-SNPs) Entries and Departures

In March, ICRC released a <u>table</u> that lists new and departing Dual Eligible Special Needs Plans (D-SNPs) by state for calendar year 2020. The resource also provides the number of D-SNP enrollees affected by these market changes. This D-SNP market landscape information can be helpful to states planning and overseeing efforts to integrate Medicare and Medicaid for their dually eligible populations.

State Count Down to 2021 – Implementing New D-SNP Integration Standards

By January 1, 2021, D-SNPs must meet new integration standards. Each month, ICRC will post tips for state Medicaid agencies to help them support the implementation of these requirements.

MedPAC March Report to the Congress: Issues Related to Integrated Care

The Medicare Payment Advisory Commission (MedPAC) released its March Report to the Congress on March 13. The report includes chapters that may be of interest to states operating or considering programs to improve coordination of Medicare and Medicaid services for dually eligible individuals.

<u>MedPAC's report</u> focuses primarily on Medicare payment for specific Medicare fee-for-service benefits as well as the Medicare Advantage (MA) managed care program. The report includes several chapters that cover Medicare services that overlap with Medicaid services for dually eligible beneficiaries, and the MA program includes D-SNPs that contract with states for coordination or integration of Medicaid services. States may want to look in particular at the chapters covering the Medicare Advantage program (Chapter 13), skilled nursing facility services (Chapter 8), home health care services (Chapter 9), and hospice services (Chapter 12).

Key 2020 Medicare Dates

ICRC developed a <u>calendar</u> of key Medicare dates to assist states and health plans in the implementation of integrated programs for people dually eligible for Medicare and Medicaid. This includes key Medicare Advantage and Prescription Drug plan dates for the year 2020.

March 2020 Enrollment in Medicare-Medicaid Plans

Between February and March 2020, total Medicare-Medicaid Plan enrollment in the nine states (CA, IL, MA, MI, NY, OH, RI, SC, and TX) currently implementing capitated model demonstrations under the Financial Alignment Initiative decreased from 386,331 to 383,925 as shown in ICRC's table <u>Monthly Enrollment in Medicare-Medicaid Plans by</u> <u>Plan and by State, March 2019 to March 2020</u>.

March 2020 Enrollment in PACE Organizations

PACE organizations provide comprehensive medical and social services to frail, community-dwelling individuals age 55 and older, most of whom are Medicare-Medicaid enrollees. As shown in ICRC's table, <u>Program of All Inclusive</u> <u>Care for the Elderly (PACE) Total Enrollment by State and by Organization</u>, PACE organizations were operating in 31 states in March 2020. Between February 2020 and March 2020, the total number of Medicare beneficiaries enrolled in PACE increased from 48,934 to 49,161.
